## RULES FOR PUBLIC COMMENTS AT LOCAL RECORDS COMMISSION MEETINGS

The meetings of the Illinois Local Records Commission are open to members of the public.

Members of the public have a right to speak at Local Records Commission meetings.

Comments by members of the public are limited to five minutes but may be extended upon a vote of the commission. A speaker may not cede time to another speaker.

A time limit for an issue is twenty (20) minutes but may be extended upon a vote of the commission.

Members of the public may only speak during their allotted speaking time or if asked a question by a member of the commission.

The chairman of the commission will determine the order of the speakers.

The chairman of the commission will determine at what point during a meeting an individual from the public may speak. If that person wishes to speak on a particular item on the agenda the chairman must allow the person to speak on that matter before a vote is taken.

Public comments must pertain to an item on the Local Records Commission agenda or to an issue that is relevant to the Local Records Commission. The chairman retains the right to stop any speaker who raises issues that are not on the agenda or are not germane to the duties of the Local Records Commission.

Members of the public have the right to distribute written materials, including copies of their comments, to the members of the commission.

Members of the public may not bring in signs, banners or other display materials.

Written copies of comments from people who are not in attendance at the meeting will not be read aloud at the meeting. If these comments are received by commission staff before the commission meeting, they will be distributed to commission members.

Individuals in need of interpreters or other special needs must contact the staff of the Local Records Commission at least three working days before the meeting. Reasonable accommodations will be made free of charge.

The chairman retains the right to stop or remove any speaker who uses profanity, makes threats or is otherwise abusive or disruptive.

The commission reserves the right to override the above rules in case of emergency or other unforeseen circumstance.
