Section 428.20 Definitions

"Advisory group", as used in this Part, means a council, commission, committee or task force created by statute, executive order, or administrative action of the Director of the Department that, among its functions, provides advice and counsel to the Department regarding its programs and services or monitors Department operations. Such advisory groups may be composed entirely or partially of persons other than Department personnel.

"Confidential intermediary" means a person who, by order of an Illinois court, is given access to various adoption related records and other confidential information not generally available to the public in order to identify and locate birth relatives of the petitioner. If the sought after relative is located, the confidential intermediary facilitates the mutually desired communication or contact as provided by statute while maintaining the confidentiality of all parties.

"Conflict of interest", as used in this Part, means an individual uses his or her official position for private gain (other than salary), gives preferential treatment to any entity or person in the conduct of official duties because of personal interest, impedes or adversely affects governmental efficiency or economy because of personal interest, fails to act impartially in the conduct of official duties because of personal interest, or engages in conduct that could adversely affect the confidence of the public in the integrity of the Department of Children and Family Services. The term also means that the circumstances are such that a reasonable person might conclude that an individual's judgement could be influenced by the nature of the circumstances or the ~~individuals~~ individual(s) involved. Conflicts of interest may be actual or potential.

"Direct financial interest" means any type of monetary gain from a Department-funded program, such as that acquired by salaried staff of Department-funded agencies, or Department staff.

"Geographic regions" means those groupings of counties designated by the Director for administration of Department programs.

Section 428.85 Confidential Intermediary Council

There shall be established under the Department of Children and Family Services a Confidential Intermediary Advisory Council. One member shall be an attorney representing the Attorney General's Office appointed by the Attorney General. One member shall be a currently certified confidential intermediary appointed by the Director of the Department of Children and Family Services. The Director shall also appoint 5 additional members. When making those appointments, the Director shall consider advocates for adopted persons, adoptive parents, birth parents, lawyers who represent clients in private adoptions, lawyers specializing in privacy law, and representatives of agencies involved in adoptions. The Director shall appoint one of the 7 members as the chairperson. An attorney from the Department of Children and Family Services and the person directly responsible for administering the confidential intermediary program shall serve as ex-officio, non-voting advisors to the Council. Council members shall serve at the discretion of the Director and shall receive no compensation other than reasonable expenses approved by the Director. The Council shall meet no less than twice yearly and shall make recommendations to the Director regarding the development of rules, procedures, and forms that will ensure efficient and effective operation of the confidential intermediary process, including:

- a) Standards of certification for confidential intermediaries.
- b) Oversight of methods used to verify that intermediaries are complying with the appropriate laws.
- c) Training for confidential intermediaries, including training with respect to federal and State privacy laws.
- d) The relationship between confidential intermediaries and the court system, including the development of sample orders defining the scope of the intermediaries' access to information.
- e) Any recent violations of policy or procedures by confidential intermediaries and remedial steps, including decertification, to prevent future violations. [750 ILCS 50/18.3a(f)]

The requirements of this Part are applicable to:

- a) Policies and contracts amended, delivered, issued, or renewed by health care plans pursuant to the Act; and
- b) The program of health benefits under the State Employees Group Insurance Act, with the exception of the fee for service program which only needs to comply with Section 85 and the definition of “emergency medical condition” contained in Section 10 of the Act; the Counties Code; the Illinois Municipal Code; the Comprehensive Health Insurance Plan Act; the Health Maintenance Organization Act; the Limited Health Service Organization Act, except for plans offering only dental services, or only vision services; the Voluntary Health Services Plans Act and the medical assistance program and other programs administered by the Department of Public Aid under the Illinois Public Aid Code; and
- c) Third party administrators, as defined in Article XXXI¹/₄ of the Code, and entities regulated under Article XX¹/₂ of the Code, generally referred to as Preferred Provider Organizations (PPOs) must comply with the requirements of Section 5420.90 and Exhibit C of this Part pursuant to Section 55 of the Act; and
- d) Any person who conducts a utilization review program in this State, except that the provisions of Section 85 of the Act are not applicable to bodily injury liability claims (including uninsured motorist and underinsured motorist coverage claims) arising under property and casualty contracts issued under Class 2 and Class 3 of the Code [215 ILCS 5/4] and does not include the retrospective review of a claim that is limited to an evaluation of reimbursement levels, veracity of documentation, accuracy of coding or adjudication for payment. Section 85 is also specifically applicable to third party administrators, PPOs and insurance companies that transact the kinds of insurance authorized under Class 1(b) or Class 2(a) of Section 4 of the Code. For purposes of this Part, an entity shall be considered to be conducting a utilization review program in this State if it evaluates the use of health care services, procedures, and facilities by persons who are either covered under contracts of insurance entered into in this State, or enrolled in an entity licensed pursuant to the Health Maintenance Organization Act, the Limited Health Service Organization Act or the Voluntary Health Services Plans Act; and
- e) Preferred provider administrators, as defined in Section 370g(g) of the Code, and insurance companies that transact the kinds of insurance authorized under Class 1(b) or Class 2(a) of Section 4 of the Code must also comply with the definition

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~~of the term emergency medical condition, as defined in Section 10 of the Act. a) All provisions of this Act are applicable to the Comprehensive Health Insurance Plan, Health Maintenance Organizations, Voluntary Health Service Organizations, and Limited Health Service Organizations except those plans offering only dental services or only vision services. In addition, Sections 55 and 85 of the Act are applicable to Third Party Administrators. Also Sections 55 and 85 of the Act, as well as compliance with the definition of the term emergency medical condition, as defined in Section 10 of the Act, are applicable to entities regulated under Article XX½ of the Insurance Code, generally referred to as Preferred Provider Organizations. Finally, Section 85 of the Act and compliance with the definition of the term "emergency medical condition" as defined in Section 10 of the Act are applicable to all insurers authorized to transact the sale of accident and health insurance in Illinois. b) Until July 1, 2000, health care plans may, but are not required to, incorporate the transition of service standards defined in Section 5420.60 of this Part and also referred to in Section 5420.40 and 5420.50 of this Part.~~

Section 5420.50 Notice of Nonrenewal or Termination

- a) All provider agreements shall provide for at least 60 days notice by the provider for termination with cause, as defined in such provider agreement, and at least 90 days notice by the provider for termination without cause. Upon receipt of such notice, the health care plan shall immediately notify enrollees of the termination and the proper steps to be taken for selecting a new health care provider. In the event the provider violates the provider agreement and does not give a notice of termination in the appropriate timeframe, the health care plan must provide immediate notice to the enrollees. The health care plan must inform the Department immediately of any known or intended termination, with or without cause, of an MCO.
- b) A health care plan must give at least 60 days notice of nonrenewal or termination of a health care provider to the health care provider and to the enrollees served by the health care provider. The notice shall include a name and address to which an enrollee or health care provider may direct comments and concerns regarding the nonrenewal or termination. Immediate written notice may be provided without 60 days notice when a health care provider's license has been disciplined by a State licensing board. The notice shall inform the enrollee of the availability of transitional services and that the enrollee must request transitional services within

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30 days from receipt of this notice.

Section 5420.70 Health Care Services, Appeals, Complaints and External Independent Reviews

- a) A plan shall affirm or deny liability on claims within a reasonable time and shall offer payment within 30 days of affirmation of liability, if the amount of the claim is determined and not in dispute. For those portions of the claim which are not in dispute and the payee is known, the plan shall tender payment within said 30 days.
- b) If a settlement of a claim is less than the amount claimed, or if the claim is denied, the plan shall provide to the insured a reasonable written explanation of the basis of the lower offer or denial within 30 days after the investigation and determination of liability is completed. This explanation shall clearly set forth the policy definition, limitation, exclusion or condition upon which denial was based. The explanation shall clearly inform the enrollee of the right to appeal the claim reduction or denial, the process by which the enrollee (or the enrollee's designee or guardian) may initiate the appeal process and the plan's phone number to call to receive more information concerning the appeal process. Notice of Availability of the Department of Insurance shall accompany this explanation.
- c) A health plan shall ensure that an enrollee (or the enrollee's designee or guardian) has a period of not less than 180 days after the date of the explanation of a denial of a claim for benefits in which to appeal such denial under this Section.
- d) Every health care plan shall submit for the Department's review, and thereafter maintain, a mechanism for the joint selection of the external independent reviewer. Any proposed changes to the mechanism must be filed for review by the Department.

Section 5420.90 Record of Complaints

- a) Complaint, as used in this Section, means any communication primarily expressing a grievance to the health care plan by, or on behalf of, the enrollee, or by the health care provider. For purposes of this definition, "communication"

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shall include the following:

- 1) A written notice relating to the health care plan's determinations, procedures and administration as stated in Sections 45 and 50 of the Act; and
 - 2) Written or oral notice filed under the expedited health care services appeal process or under the utilization review process.
- b) The health care plan shall submit to the Director a report by April 1 ~~March 1~~ for the previous calendar year which shall include a record of the plan's complaints in the format prescribed in Exhibit C of this Part. Beginning April 1, 2004, all plans or companies must electronically submit the record of complaints to the Director in a format presented by the Director.
- c) Any plan or company failing to file a complaint report by April 1 for the previous calendar year may be subject to a late fee of \$100 for each day the report is late.

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enrollee or policyholder regarding the extent to which the enrollee or policyholder may obtain available services at the time they are needed – such service refers to both telephone access and ease of scheduling an appointment);

- e) Underwriting (dissatisfaction by an enrollee or policyholder regarding the health care plan's process of examining, accepting, or rejecting insurance risks and classifying those selected in order to charge the proper premiums for each);
- f) Marketing and sales (dissatisfaction regarding solicitation or the sale of a policy by the managed care organization; solicitation means any method by which information relative to the health care plan is made known to the public for the purpose of informing or influencing potential enrollees to enroll in the health care plan, regardless of the media or technique used);

Section 810.10 Sale of Fish and Fishing Seasons

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- a) No fish or parts thereof (including eggs) taken by sport fishing methods (including snagging) may be bought, sold or bartered.
- b) Lake Michigan – The sport fishing season for rainbow smelt shall be from March 1 to April 30.
- c) It is unlawful to fish within 250 yards of an occupied duck or goose blind on Department-owned or -managed sites during the migratory waterfowl season.
- d) Lake Michigan, Calumet River, and the Chicago River including its North Branch, South Branch, and the North Shore Channel – the sport fishing harvest for yellow perch shall not be permitted from July 1 through July 31~~June 1 through June 30~~ annually.

Section 810.20 Snagging

- a) Anglers are permitted only one pole and line device to which can be attached no more than two hooks.
- b) Species of Fish and Snagging Catch Limit.
 - 1) Only the following species of fish and catch limit may be taken by snagging:
 - Carp – no catch limit
 - Buffalo – no catch limit
 - Freshwater Drum – no catch limit
 - Salmon (coho and chinook only) – 5 daily, of which not more than 3 may be of the same fish species
 - Paddlefish – 2 per day
 - Bowfin – no catch limit
 - Gizzard shad – no catch limit

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Carp suckers – no catch limit

Longnose gar – no catch limit

Shortnose gar – no catch limit

Suckers – no catch limit

- 2) No sorting of snagged salmon and paddlefish is permitted. Every salmon 10 inches in total length or longer and paddlefish snagged must be taken into immediate possession and included in the daily catch limit. Once the daily limit of salmon or paddlefish has been reached, snagging must cease.

c) Waters Open to Snagging and Snagging Season.

- 1) Snagging for fish is permitted from September 15 through December 15 and from March 15 through May 15 within a 300 yard downstream limit below all locks and dams of the Illinois River and Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri. Snagging is permitted from January 1 through April 15 within a 500 yard downstream limit below locks and dams on the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa, except the tailwaters of Lock and Dam 12 and 13 are closed to all fishing from December 1 through March 15.
- 2) Snagging for fish is permitted year-round within a 100 yard limit upstream or downstream of the dam at Horseshoe Lake in Alexander County.
- 3) Snagging for chinook and coho salmon only is permitted from the following Lake Michigan shoreline areas from October 1 through December 31; however, no snagging is allowed at any time within 200 feet of a moored watercraft or as posted:
 - A) Lincoln Park Lagoon from the Fullerton Avenue Bridge to the southern end of the Lagoon.
 - B) Waukegan Harbor (in North Harbor basin only).
 - C) Winnetka Power Plant discharge area.

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- D) Jackson Harbor (Inner and Outer Harbors).
- d) Disposition of Snagged Salmon and Paddlefish. All snagged salmon and paddlefish must be removed from the area from which they are taken and disposed of properly, in accordance with Article 5, Section 5-5 of the Fish and Aquatic Life Code.

Section 810.35 Statewide Sportfishing Regulations – Daily Catch and Size Limits

- a) Length is measured from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail with the fish laid flat on a ruler, with the mouth of the fish closed and the tail lobes pressed together.
- b) No fish species may be dressed (fileted or head and tail removed) on any waters to which length or bag limits are applicable. Regardless of where taken, no fish less than the specified minimum length or more than the daily catch shall be possessed while taking from, or on, any waters to which length or bag limits and/or daily catch limits apply. While taking from areas designated as "Catch and Release Only", all catch and release species must be immediately released back into the waters from which taken.
- c) Statewide limits by type of fish:
- 1) CHANNEL CATFISH

There are no daily catch or size limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.
 - 2) LARGEMOUTH BASS, SMALLMOUTH BASS, SPOTTED BASS

Daily catch limit is 6 bass, either singly or in the aggregate, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations. In streams and rivers (excluding the mainstem of the Mississippi, Ohio and Wabash Rivers) the daily creel can contain no more than 3 smallmouth bass. In streams and tributaries statewide, except for the Mississippi, Ohio, Wabash and Illinois Rivers, all smallmouth bass must be immediately released between April 1 and June 15. There is no statewide size limit.

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3) MUSKELLUNGE, NORTHERN PIKE AND THEIR HYBRIDS

- A) All muskellunge and muskellunge hybrids (tiger muskie) taken must be 36 inches in total length or longer, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
- B) No more than 1 muskellunge or muskellunge hybrid (tiger muskie), either singly or in the aggregate, may be taken per day, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
- C) All northern pike taken must be 24 inches in total length or longer, except in the Mississippi River and Ohio River where there is no size limit.
- D) No more than 3 northern pike may be taken per day, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.

4) CRAPPIE (WHITE, BLACK OR HYBRID CRAPPIE)

There are no catch or size limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.

5) BLUEGILL AND REDEAR SUNFISH

There are no catch or size limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.

6) STRIPED BASS (OCEAN ROCKFISH), WHITE BASS, YELLOW BASS AND HYBRIDS

There are no daily catch limits or minimum size limits for striped bass (ocean rockfish), white bass, yellow bass and their hybrids, which are less than 17 inches in total length, except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations. For these fish 17 inches in total length or longer, the daily limit is 3 fish, either singly or in the aggregate, except in the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri where there is a 30 fish daily creel limit for all striped, white, yellow or hybrid striped bass. In the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa, there is a 25 fish daily creel on striped bass, white bass, yellow bass and their hybrids, either singly or in the aggregate.

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7) TROUT AND SALMON

Daily catch limit is 5 trout or salmon, either singly or in the aggregate.

8) WALLEYE, SAUGER OR THEIR HYBRID

A) All walleye, sauger, or their hybrid (saugeye) taken must be 14 inches in total length or longer, except in the Mississippi River, Ohio River, Wabash River, or as specified under Site Specific Regulations.

B) Daily catch limit is 6 walleye, sauger or their hybrid, either singly or in the aggregate, except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.

9) INJURIOUS SPECIES

For injurious species, as described in 17 Ill. Adm. Code 805, there are no catch or size limits. Possession of live specimens, progeny thereof, viable eggs, or gametes is prohibited.

Section 810.37 Definitions for Site Specific Sportfishing Regulations

a) Site Specific Regulations are listed by water area affected. The coverage of the regulation is dictated by the extent of the water area listed and not by the county. In some cases, regulations for a given water area or site may extend beyond the counties listed. The counties listed refer to the location of the dam or outfall for impoundments or mouths of small streams. Since large rivers or streams usually flow through many counties, the term "Multiple" is used rather than listing all counties where the large stream or river flows.

b) The subsections listed below are referred to by number in Section 810.45. Each water area listed in Section 810.45 has numbers in parenthesis which explain all of the definitions in this Section which apply to that water area.

1) Anglers must not use more than 2 poles and each pole must not have more than 2 hooks or lures attached while fishing, except that legal size cast

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nets, (in accordance with subsection 810.50(a)(1)) shad scoops, and minnow seines may be used to obtain shad, minnows, and crayfish to use as bait, provided that they are not sold.

- 2) All jugs set in a body of water shall be under the immediate supervision of the fisherman. Immediate supervision shall be defined as the fisherman being on the water where the jugs are set and readily available to identify jugs to law enforcement officers.
- 3) All largemouth and smallmouth bass taken must be less than 12 inches in total length or greater than 15 inches in total length.
- 4) Except that sport fishermen shall be allowed to use trotlines, jugs, and by hand, except that the use and aid of underwater breathing devices is prohibited. West of Wolf Creek Road, fishing from boats is permitted all year. Trotlines/jugs must be removed from sunrise until sunset from Memorial Day through Labor Day. East of Wolf Creek Road, fishing from boats is permitted from March 15 through September 30. Fishing from the bank is permitted all year only at the Wolf Creek and Route 148 causeways. On the entire lake, jugs and trotlines must be checked daily and must be removed on the last day they are used. It is illegal to use stakes to anchor any trotlines; they must be anchored only with portable weights and must be removed on the last day they are used. The taking of carp and buffalo with bow and arrow is permissible.
- 5) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, carpsuckers, buffalo, gar, bowfin and suckers by pitchfork, gigs, bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices.
- 6) Including the Fox River south of the Illinois-Wisconsin line to the [Algonquin Dam and the Nippersink Creek upstream to the Wilmot Road Bridge](#)~~McHenry Dam~~.
- 7) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, buffalo, suckers and gar by bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices, gigs or spears during May and June.
- 8) Daily catch limit includes Striped Bass, White Bass, Yellow Bass and Hybrid Striped Bass either singly or in the aggregate.

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- 9) Catch and Release Fishing Only means that fish (all or identified species) caught must be immediately released alive and in good condition back into the water from which it came.
- 10) It shall be illegal to possess trout during the period of October 1 to 5 a.m. on the third Saturday in October (both dates inclusive) which were taken during that period.
- 11) It shall be illegal to possess trout during the period of March 15 to 5 a.m. on the 1st Saturday in April (both dates inclusive) which were taken during that period.
- 12) Daily catch limit for largemouth or smallmouth bass, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 6 fish per day, no more than one of which shall be greater than 15 inches in length and none of which shall be greater than 12 inches and less than or equal to 15 inches in length.
- 13) Except that jug fishing is permitted from the hours of sunset to sunrise, and except that carp and buffalo may be taken by bow and arrow devices from May 1 through September 30. All jugs must have owner's/user's name and complete address affixed.
- 14) Daily catch limit includes all fish species (either singly or in the aggregate) caught within each of the following fish groupings.
 - A) Largemouth or Smallmouth Bass
 - B) Walleye, Sauger, or their hybrid
 - C) Bluegill, Redear Sunfish or Pumpkinseed
 - D) Channel or Blue Catfish
- 15) Daily catch limit includes white, black, or hybrid crappie either singly or in the aggregate.
- 16) Daily catch limit includes Striped Bass, White Bass and Hybrid Striped Bass either singly or in the aggregate.
- 17) Daily catch limit shall not exceed 10 fish daily, no more than 3 of which

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may be 17 inches or longer in length.

- 18) Except that sport fishermen shall be allowed to use trotlines, jugs and bank poles; and carp, carpsuckers and buffalo may be taken by bow and arrow, bow and arrow devices, gigs and spears in the portions of the lake that lie north of the Davenport Bridge and northeast of the Parnell Bridge.
- 19) No fishing within 250 yards of an occupied waterfowl blind (within the hunting area) on all Department-owned or -managed sites.
- 20) Carlyle Lake (including its tributary streams and those portions of the Kaskaskia River and Hurricane Creek up to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Carlyle Lake Project boundaries), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Bond, Clinton, and Fayette Counties.
- 21) Lake Shelbyville (including its tributary streams and those portions of the West Okaw and Kaskaskia Rivers up to Lake Shelbyville Project boundaries – including parts of the Lake Shelbyville Fish and Wildlife Management Area), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Shelby and Moultrie Counties. ~~Does not include the tailwater.~~
- 22) Rend Lake (including its tributary streams and those portions of the Big Muddy and Casey Fork Rivers up to the Rend Lake Project boundaries), Rend Lake Project Ponds, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Franklin and Jefferson Counties.
- 23) Daily catch limit for black, white or hybrid crappies, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 20 fish daily, no more than 10 of which can be below 10" in total length and ~~no~~ more than 10 of which can be 10" or longer in total length.
- 24) 15" minimum length limit for walleye with no possession of walleye greater than or equal to 20" and less than or equal to 27" in total length – protected slot limit. ~~10 Fish Daily Creel Limit of which no more than 6 may be walleye.~~
- 25) Daily catch limit for largemouth or smallmouth bass, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 3 fish per day, no more than one of which may be equal to or greater than 15 inches in total length and no more than 2 of which may be less than 15 inches in total length.

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- 26) Lake Vermilion – Trotline and jug fishing allowed north of Boiling Springs Road.
- 27) Except that bank fishing is prohibited. Boat fishing is permitted May 1 through August 31 during the hours of 2:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. See site for additional regulations and exact opening and closing dates.
- 28) Except that trotlines may be set within 300 feet from shore.
- 29) Except that carp, buffalo, suckers and carpsuckers may be taken by means of pitchfork and gigs (no bow and arrow devices).
- 30) Fishing is permitted from March 15 through September 30, both dates inclusive, from sunrise to sunset. Fishing during all other times of the year is illegal and not permitted.
- 31) Daily catch limit for largemouth or smallmouth bass, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 3 fish daily, no more than one of which may be equal to or greater than 15 inches in total length and no more than 2 of which may be less than 12 inches in total length.
- 32) Daily catch limit includes Striped Bass, White Bass, Yellow Bass and Hybrid Striped Bass, either singly or in the aggregate, no more than 4 of which may be 15 inches or longer in length.
- 33) It shall be unlawful to enter upon a designated waterfowl hunting area during the 7 days prior to the regular duck season, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from 2 weeks prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season.
- 34) Except that sport fishermen may take carp, buffalo, suckers and gar by bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices, gigs, or spears from May 1 through August 31.
- 35) Daily catch limit for Walleye, Sauger, or Hybrid Walleye, singly or in the aggregate, shall not exceed 3 fish daily, no more than one of which may be greater than 24 inches in total length and no more than 2 of which may be

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less than 18 inches in total length and greater than or equal to 14 inches in total length.

- 36) Except that sportfishermen may not use a minnow seine, cast net, or shad scoop for bait collecting in Cook County Forest Preserve District Waters (except in the Des Plaines River).
- 37) All smallmouth bass taken must be less than 12 inches in total length or greater than 18 inches in total length. Only 1 bass greater than 18 inches and 2 bass less than 12 inches may be taken in the creel daily.
- 38) All largemouth and smallmouth bass taken must be less than 14 inches in total length or greater than 18 inches in total length. Only 1 bass greater than 18 inches and 5 bass less than 14 inches may be taken in the creel daily.
- 39) Powerton Lake shall be closed to boat traffic, except for legal waterfowl hunters, from one week prior to regular waterfowl season to February 15, and closed to all unauthorized entry during the regular goose and duck season.
- 40) The 48 inch total length limit on pure muskellunge applies to that body of water listed as well as any tailwaters as defined below:

Evergreen Lake (McLean County) – including the portion of Six Mile Creek below the Evergreen Lake Dam downstream to its confluence with the Mackinaw River.

Forbes State Lake (Marion County) – no tailwaters

Fox Chain O' Lakes (Lake/McHenry Counties) – including ~~those portions of~~ the Fox River south of the Wisconsin-Illinois boundary to the Algonquin Dam and the Nippersink Creek upstream to the Wilmot Road Bridge below the McHenry Dam downstream to the Route 176 Bridge and upstream to the Wisconsin-Illinois State line.

Kinkaid Lake (Jackson County) – including the portion of Kinkaid Creek below the Kinkaid Lake Dam downstream to the Route 149 Bridge.

Lake Mingo and Kennekuk Cove Park Ponds (Vermilion County) – no

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tailwaters.

Lake Shelbyville (Moultrie/Shelby Counties) – including the portion of the Kaskaskia River below the Lake Shelbyville Dam downstream to the State Route 128 Road Bridge near Cowden.

Otter Lake (Macoupin County) – including the portion of Otter Creek below Otter Lake Dam downstream to its confluence with East Otter Creek.

"Appointment" means an arrangement made by a telecommunications carrier to meet a customer within an agreed 4 hour window, or, until June 30, 2003, between 8 A.M. and 4 P.M. on a particular day if the carrier uses the resold services, network or network elements of another carrier to provide service to the customer, at the customer's premises to perform work on the network.

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"Basic local exchange service" means residential and business lines used for local exchange telecommunications service as defined in Section 13-204 of the Act [220 ILCS 5/13-204], excluding: services that employ advanced telecommunications capability as defined in section 706(c)(1) of the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996; vertical services; company official lines; and records work only. [220 ILCS 5/13-712(b)(2)]

"Basic local exchange service installation" means the installation of basic local exchange service whereby the physical connecting and diagnostic testing of a local loop results in the provisioning of dial tone to the requesting customer's network interface device. It includes move orders and orders for additional lines.

"Commission" means the Illinois Commerce Commission.

"Customer" means any person, building owner, firm, partnership, corporation, municipality, cooperative, organization, governmental agency, etc., provided with local exchange carrier telecommunications services as defined in Section 13-204 of the Act [220 ILCS 5/13-204]. "Customer" may also be referred to as "end user".

"Emergency situation" means a single event that causes an interruption of service or installations affecting end users of a local exchange carrier. The emergency situation shall begin with the first end user whose service is interrupted by the single event and shall end with the restoration or installation of the service of all affected end users. The term "single event" shall include:

a declaration made by the applicable State or federal governmental agency that the area served by the local exchange carrier is either a State or federal disaster area; or

an act of third parties, including acts of terrorism, vandalism, riot, civil unrest, or war, or acts of parties that are not agents, employees or contractors of the local exchange carrier, ~~or the first 90 calendar days of a strike or other work stoppage~~; or

a severe storm, tornado, earthquake, flood or fire, including any severe storm, tornado, earthquake, flood or fire that prevents the local exchange carrier from restoring service due to impassable roads, downed power lines, or the closing off of affected areas by public safety officials.

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The term "emergency situation" shall not include:

a single event caused by high temperature conditions alone; or

a single event caused, or exacerbated in scope and duration, by acts or omissions of the local exchange carrier, its agents, employees or contractors or by the condition of facilities, equipment, or premises owned or operated by the local exchange carrier; or

any service interruption that occurs during a single event listed above, but are not caused by those single events; or

a single event that the local exchange carrier could have reasonably foreseen and taken precaution to prevent; provided, however, that in no event shall a local exchange carrier be required to undertake precautions that are technically infeasible or economically prohibitive.

This Part shall be construed as being content neutral as to whether a strike or other work stoppage is an "emergency situation". In the event of a strike or other work stoppage, the local exchange carrier's obligation to pay customer credits shall, in the absence of a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction, be determined by the Commission on a case-by-case basis based upon the individual factual circumstances of each strike or other work stoppage. In making such a determination, and notwithstanding the definition of "emergency situation" above, the Commission shall not presume that a strike or other work stoppage is an act of an employee or of the local exchange carrier.

"Link Up" means the Link Up Assistance program defined and established at 47 CFR 54.411 et seq., as amended. [220 ILCS 5/13-712(b)(3)]

"Monthly recurring charge" means monthly access/usage rate, end user common line charge, and tariffed vertical services.

 - 7) Non-relative Exempt from Licensing (Care provided in the home of the child. No more than three children may be cared for, including the provider's own children, unless all children are from the same household); and
 - 8) Relative Exempt from Licensing (Care provided in the home of the child. No more than three children may be cared for, including the provider's own children, unless all children are from the same household).
- b) Payments will not be made to a provider who is the child's mother or father, or to a stepparent who is currently married to the child's parent and is living in the same household as the child, or to any provider who is included in the same public assistance grant as the child (for those families receiving such assistance).
- c) Payments will not be made to a provider (even if operating within a setting

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exempt from licensing) who has been convicted of crimes enumerated in 89 Ill. Adm. Code 385, Background Checks.

- d) Payments will not be made to a provider who, after receiving written notification of an outstanding overpayment, fails to establish a repayment plan or is in default of a repayment plan.

SUBPART C: FINANCIAL FACTORS OF ELIGIBILITY

Section 121.31 Exempt Unearned Income

The following unearned income is exempt:

- a) Vendor payments when these are made in behalf of a household by a nonhousehold member with nonhousehold funds, and paid directly to the household's creditors or person or organization providing the service to the household. (This includes rent and mortgage payments made to landlords or mortgagees by Housing and Urban Development (HUD));
- b) Monies that are legally obligated and otherwise payable to the household such as, but not limited to, garnished wages, public assistance grants directed to a protective payee, GA disbursing orders and payments directed to a vendor, and support or alimony payments legally obligated to a household member, but which are diverted by the provider of the payment to a third party for a household expense, are counted as income and not excluded as a vendor payment. The following are considered vendor payments and not diverted income:
 - 1) Rent paid directly to a landlord by a household's employer in addition to paying the household its regular wages;
 - 2) Assistance payments that would not normally be provided in a money payment to the household, and that are over and above normal public assistance or general assistance grants, if they are made directly to a third party for a household expense;
 - 3) Child support or alimony payments specified by a court order or other legally binding agreement to go directly to a third party rather than to a household;
 - 4) Support payments not required by a court order or other legally binding agreement (such as, payments in excess of an amount specified in a court order or written agreement) which are paid to a third party rather than to the household;

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- 5) Public Assistance or General Assistance payments to a third party in behalf of a household for medical, child care, or energy assistance (Public Assistance means AFDC and AABD);
 - 6) From October 20, 1987, to September 30, 1989, the entire amount of Public Assistance or General Assistance payments to third parties in behalf of a household for temporary housing, even any portion of the payment which is part of the normal Public Assistance or General Assistance payment, provided the housing lacks facilities for preparation and cooking of hot meals or refrigerated food storage; and
 - 7) Emergency Public Assistance (PA) or General Assistance (GA) payments made directly to a third party (that is, vendor payment) on behalf of a migrant or seasonal farmworker household while the household is in the job stream. This assistance includes, but is not limited to, emergency vendor payments for housing or transportation.
- c) Cash donations based on need received on or after February 1, 1988, from one or more private nonprofit charitable organizations, but not to exceed \$300 in a federal fiscal year quarter;
 - d) Any income in the certification period which is received too infrequently or irregularly to be reasonably anticipated, not in excess of ~~\$50~~\$30 per quarter;
 - e) All loans ~~other than educational loans~~ on which repayment is deferred;
 - f) Reimbursements for past or future expenses, to the extent they do not exceed actual expenses and do not represent a gain or benefit to the household. This does not include reimbursements for normal living expenses;
 - g) Monies received and used for the care and maintenance of a third-party beneficiary who is not a household member. Foster care payments are considered income to the adult or child in foster care and not income to the household providing the foster care even if the payments are made to the provider household rather than to the adult or child or children in foster care. If the household chooses to include the adults and/or children in foster care as part of the household, the entire foster care payment is considered unearned income to the household;

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- h) Income of nonhousehold members except ineligible household members who have been sanctioned for fraud or intentional program violation, for failure to comply with work registration requirements due to a voluntary job quit or reduction in work hours, or failure to comply with the FSE&T program, for failure to meet the social security number requirements, because of ineligible alien status, or due to questionable citizenship status (see Section 121.73);
- i) Payments to volunteers under the Domestic Volunteer Service Act (42 USC 4951-4993) (VISTA) are exempt only if the individual:
 - 1) was receiving food stamps or public assistance at the time he or she joined VISTA; and/or
 - 2) was receiving an exempted VISTA payment, or other subsistence payments under Title I of the Domestic Volunteer Services Act, prior to March 1, 1979, and the volunteer contract in effect March 1, 1979, has not expired;
- j) Income received from the disposition of funds to the Grand River Band of Ottawa Indians;
- k) Any income specifically excluded by any federal statute from income consideration for food stamp purposes;
- l) Unearned income such as need based payments, cash assistance, compensation in lieu of wages and allowances through the Job Training Partnership Act (29 USC 1501-1781);
- m) Payments made by the Illinois Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities under the Family Assistance Program for Mentally Disabled Children under P.A. 86-921;
- n) Income received from the Social Security Administration under the PASS Program; ~~and~~
- o) Payments made under the federal Crime Act of 1984 (as amended by P.L. 104-132, Section 234, Crime Victims Fund); ~~and-~~
- p) All educational loans, grants, scholarships, fellowships, veteran's educational benefits, and all federal and State work study programs.

- a) For purposes of this Section, the following definitions shall apply:

"Certificate of Insurance" – certificate filed with the Secretary of State's Office as proof that the person has purchased financial responsibility insurance [as outlined in 625 ILCS 5/7-315](#).

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"Department" – Department of Driver Services of the Office of the Secretary of State.

"Financial Responsibility Insurance" – insurance used to establish proof of financial responsibility as established in Sections 7-315 and 7-316 of the Illinois Safety and Family Financial Responsibility Law [625 ILCS 5/7-315 and 7-316] ~~(Ill. Rev. Stat. 1989, ch. 95½, pars. 7-315 and 7-316).~~

"Illinois Insurance Guarantee Fund" – section of the Illinois Department of Insurance which deals with disposition of assets following bankruptcy.

"Law" – the Illinois Safety and Family Financial Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code [625 ILCS 5/Ch. 7].

"Lien" – claim on property of another as security for payment of a just debt.

"Motor Vehicle Liability Policy" – "owner's policy" or an "operator's policy" of liability insurance which is certified pursuant to Section 7-315 or 7-316, and comports with Section 7-302 of the ~~Illinois Safety Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code~~ and which complies with the requirements of Section 7-317(b), (c), (d), and (f) of the ~~Illinois Safety Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code~~.

"Proof of Financial Responsibility for the Future" – ability to respond in damages for any liability resulting from the ownership, maintenance, use or operation of a motor vehicle as provided in Section 7-302 of the ~~Illinois Safety Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code~~.

"Real Estate Bond" – proof filed pursuant to Section 7-320 of the ~~Illinois Safety Responsibility Law (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1985, ch. 95½, par. 7-320).~~

"Secretary of State" – Secretary of State of Illinois.

"Stock" – proportionate share in ownership of corporation held by individual and which is usually represented by a stock certificate.

"Surety" – a person who makes himself/herself liable for another's debts or defaults of obligations.

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- b) When a person purchases insurance to file proof of financial responsibility for the future, the insurance company will file a certificate of insurance with the Department. The certificate filed shall be either the AAMVA (American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators) Uniform Financial Responsibility form, containing the insured's name and address, license number, and birthdate; current policy number and effective date of the insurance policy and the name of the insurance company with the signature of its authorized representative, or other certificate of insurance proof conforming to the requirements of Section paragraphs 7-315 or 7-316 of the Illinois Financial Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code, which is endorsed and certifies policy limits as specified in Section paragraph 7-302 of the Law this Part. If an owner's rather than operator's policy, it must include the model year, trade name and identification number of the vehicle. The owner's policy must also conform with the amounts specified in Section 7-302 of the Illinois Safety Responsibility Law.
- c) If a person purchases a certificate of insurance to satisfy his/her requirement to file future proof of financial responsibility and the insurance company fails and is no longer in business, and ceases operations by order of a court, and the Department is notified by the Illinois Insurance Guarantee Fund of the non-operation of the insurance company, the person shall have 30 thirty (30) days after notification by the Department to file a new certificate of insurance or satisfy his/her future proof requirement by cash or one of the other alternate methods provided in Section 7-314 of the Illinois Safety Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code. If a suspension has been entered even though the person has filed future proof of financial responsibility within the 30 thirty (30) day time period, the suspension shall be removed.
- d) If a person required to furnish proof of financial responsibility for the future chooses to file a bond pursuant to Section 7-320 of the Illinois Safety Responsibility Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code, and the bond is executed by the person giving the proof and two individual sureties, the following conditions must be met:
- 1) Each surety must own real estate within the State of Illinois.
 - 2) Each surety must have equity in that real estate in the amount of the bond.
 - 3) The bond must be endorsed by the clerk of the court and approved by a judge as provided in Section 7-320 of the Illinois Safety Responsibility

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~~Law of the Illinois Vehicle Code.~~

- e) If any evidence of proof of financial responsibility for the future filed under the ~~Illinois Safety Responsibility~~ Law falls below the amount required as provided in Section 7-302 of the ~~Illinois Safety Responsibility~~ Law ~~of the Illinois Vehicle Code~~, additional evidence shall be required. Cash and securities are deposited with the Illinois State Treasurer and the Treasurer monitors the securities and informs the Department if its value falls below the amount required. A certificate of insurance or bonds, real estate bonds that are without liens, stocks, and cash shall be accepted as evidence to establish the additional required proof of financial responsibility for the future. The additional security shall be sent to the Safety and Financial Responsibility Section, Department of Driver Services, 2701 South Dirksen Parkway, Springfield, Illinois; 62723.
- f) Whenever any evidence of proof of ability to respond in damages required to be filed pursuant to the provisions of ~~Article III, Chapter 95½~~, Section 7-301 ~~of the Law~~ no longer fulfills the purpose for which required, the Department shall require other evidence of ability to respond in damages including but not limited to an endorsed certificate of insurance meeting the requirements of Section 7-302 of the ~~Illinois Responsibility~~ Law ~~of the Illinois Vehicle Code~~, bonds, unencumbered real estate bonds, stocks or cash. The person required to post proof shall have 30 ~~thirty (30)~~ days after notification by the Department to post or file additional proof. If the person fails to post proof within 30 ~~thirty (30)~~ days then the Secretary of State shall suspend the driver's license, registration certificate, license plates and registration sticker pending receipt of such proof.
- g) Proof of Financial Responsibility as required in the Law shall be made by filing with the Secretary of State a written or electronic certificate of insurance. Notices of cancellation or termination of the certified policy of insurance proof as required in Sections 7-315 and 7-318 of the Law must be submitted in writing or electronically. All written or electronic certificates of insurance proof and cancellation or termination as required in the Law must be submitted in a manner satisfactory to the Secretary of State.

SUBPART U: COLLECTION AUTHORITY

Section 100.9030 Department of Revenue Debt Collection Bureau to Assume Collection Duties
EMERGENCY

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This Part is to implement Public Act 93-0570 and set forth when and how the Department of Revenue Debt Collection Bureau assumes jurisdiction over State agency delinquent debt. Effective July 1, 2004, the Department of Revenue has been given the statutory responsibility of collecting certain delinquent debt.

Section 100.9040 Referral of Delinquent Debt
EMERGENCY

Upon certification of delinquent debt from other State of Illinois agencies, the Department of Revenue Debt Collection Bureau (Bureau) shall serve as the primary debt collection entity for the State of Illinois and in that role shall collect delinquent debt on behalf of agencies of the State [30 ILCS 210/5].

- a) The Bureau will begin collection efforts only after the delinquent debts are certified to the Bureau by the referring agencies.
 - 1) Agencies referring delinquent debt to the Bureau shall certify for each delinquent debt referred that the provisions of this rule have been complied with. No delinquent debt shall be referred to the Bureau until the referring agency has afforded the debtor notice and an opportunity to contest the amount of the debt. The debtor shall have no right to a hearing before the Bureau to contest the validity of the debt. The debtor shall be afforded notice and an opportunity to contest the debt by the referring agency prior to referral of the delinquent debt to the Bureau. No debt shall be referred to the Bureau until the debtor has been notified of the amount and basis for the debt, the potential referral of the debt to the Bureau, and the procedure and time limitations for contesting the validity of the debt. Unless disputed in writing within 90 days of the date of notice by the referring agency, a debt shall be considered undisputed, delinquent, and suitable for referral to the Bureau.
 - 2) The Bureau lacks the statutory authority to begin collection activities on its own initiative with respect to any delinquent debt that has not been certified to the Bureau by the referring agency.

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- 3) The Bureau has no authority to accept referrals for collection of delinquent debt from the public, from the courts, or from any other agency of local or federal government other than the agencies duly authorized by the statutes.
- 4) The Bureau shall have no obligation to collect debts secured by an interest in real property.
- b) *Once a delinquent debt has been certified to the Bureau, the Bureau may collect the delinquency using all legal authority available to the Department of Revenue to collect debt and all legal authority available to the referring agency [30 ILCS 210/5]. Specifically, the Bureau may use all collection methods authorized to collect tax debt as set forth in the various tax Acts.*
- c) The Bureau shall notify the referring agency when a delinquent debt or any portion of it has been collected. Any amount of the delinquent debt collected by the Bureau, including any amount that results in overpayment of the delinquent debt, shall be deposited in, or transferred to the appropriate funds as specified by statute. Thereafter, referring agencies shall bear the responsibility for adjusting overpayments.
- d) The Bureau shall promptly deposit delinquent debt receipts in the General Revenue Fund unless otherwise directed by the referring agency or required by law. Thereafter, the referring agency shall be responsible for the distribution of delinquent debt collected by the Bureau. Allocation of delinquent debt collections shall be the responsibility of the referring agency.
- e) Delinquent debt certified to the Bureau shall be transmitted to the Bureau in an electronic format approved by the Bureau. Delinquent debt certified to the Bureau shall include such information as the Bureau shall require, including but not limited to:

 - 1) The identity of the debtor, including name, address and social security number.
 - 2) For business debtors, the name and type of business organization, business address, federal employers identification number, and owners and officers of the business.
 - 3) The nature and amount of the delinquent debt (including fees, penalties and interest).

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- 4) A brief description of the delinquent debt including date the debt was incurred.
- 5) All action taken to collect the debt to date.
- 6) All legal restrictions relating to collection of the debt.
- f) Delinquent debt that has been discharged in bankruptcy or that is currently in bankruptcy shall not be referred to the Bureau.
- g) The Bureau shall make every reasonable effort to collect delinquent debt using all collection tools available. If reasonable collection efforts prove unavailing, the Bureau may declare the delinquent debt uncollectible and return it to the referring agency which shall write the delinquent debt off as uncollectible pursuant to rules established by the Comptroller, or return the delinquent debt to the Bureau.
- h) The Bureau may refuse to accept referral of delinquent debt the Bureau has previously deemed uncollectible absent factual assertions by the referring agency that due to circumstances not known at the time the delinquent debt was deemed uncollectible additional collection efforts are warranted.
- i) Agencies should not utilize outside collection agencies prior to referring delinquent debt to the Bureau.
- j) The Bureau's responsibilities under this Subpart shall be subject to appropriation by the General Assembly.
- k) The Bureau shall employ qualified collections specialists to perform the requirements of this rule, subject to funding by the General Assembly.

Section 100.1050 Uncollectible Delinquent Debt
EMERGENCY

The Bureau may deem debt uncollectible by the Bureau, and return uncollectible delinquent debt to the referring agency. [30 ILCS 210/10(d)]

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- a) The Bureau may deem delinquent debt uncollectible when it has exhausted all reasonable collection efforts. Specific collection procedures may vary by agency and with the size and nature of the debt. Prior to deeming any delinquent debt uncollectible, the Bureau shall document efforts to accomplish the following collection objectives:
- 1) Confirm the current location of the debtor.
 - 2) Locate evidence of the debtor's assets.
 - 3) Use all available collections tools to collect the delinquent debt.
- b) The Bureau shall maintain documentation of the efforts undertaken to collect the delinquent debt and the results of the efforts. Delinquent debt shall be returned to the referring Agency only after the Bureau has exhausted all reasonable collection efforts.

For all debt accruing after July 1, 2003, State agencies shall collect such debtor identification information as the Department of Revenue shall require, including but not limited to FEIN or SSN. Prior to referring debt arrearages to the Bureau, agencies shall provide the Bureau such summary and detailed information as the Bureau shall request, including but not limited to the nature and basis of the arrearages, the agency's procedures for validating the debt, the age of the arrearage, efforts to collect the arrearage. Upon referral of arrearages, agencies shall promptly deliver to the Bureau a copy of all records relating to the debt with a status report describing all collection action taken by the agency.
