State Library receives grant to expand ILEAD U

The State Library has hosted two very successful continuing education initiatives called ILEAD U — Illinois Libraries Explore, Apply and Discover. ILEAD U was designed to help library staff understand and respond to user needs through the application of participatory technology tools and the creation of an easy-to-replicate model program. While the first year was limited to Illinois library staff, this year librarians from other states traveled to Springfield to take part in ILEAD U.

The State Library has recently been awarded a \$470,000 Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services to expand ILEAD U nationwide. Next year, ILEAD U becomes ILEAD USA. Twenty-eight five-member teams in Illinois, Colorado, Iowa, Ohio and Utah will attend three three-day, in-person sessions over the course of nine months.

ILEAD USA will be held March 25-28. June 17-20, and October 21-24, 2013. The sessions will be held simultaneously in each of the five states, with plenary sessions broadcast live on streaming video. In-person sessions, virtual meetings and activities will allow participants to hone their newly acquired skills; experiment with participatory technology tools; and continue communication with the ILEAD USA network of participants.

The Institute of Museum and Library Services is the primary source of federal support for the nation's 123,000 libraries and 17,500 museums. Through grant making, policy development and research, IMLS communities and individuals thrive through broad public access to knowledge, cultural heritage and lifelong learning. "Eliminate the Digital Divide" grants awarded

Secretary of State Jesse White has announced that 15 public libraries will share in a nearly \$400,000 grant awarded to the Illinois State Library to enhance broadband computer access to citizens across Illinois.

"The digital divide prevents many lowincome citizens from having access to important technology and educational programs that can greatly enrich their lives," said Secretary White. "Having access to information allows citizens to engage in lifelong learning, and these grants will allow libraries and other providers to offer critical services that will hopefully allow more Illinoisans to lead better, more productive lives."

The grant is being awarded by the Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic

CHICAGO TALKING BOOK CENTER WINS AWARD

The Chicago Public Library Talking Book Center, a member of the Illinois Network of Talking Book and Braille Libraries, was named winner of the 2011 Network Subregional Library Award by the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS). Director Debbie Taylor accepted the award at a luncheon in Washington, D.C., in June. The Illinois Network of Talking Book and Braille Libraries also includes the Illinois State Library Talking Book and Braille Service, the Mid-Illinois Talking Book Center and the Voices of Vision Talking Book Center. In 2005, the State Library Talking Book and Braille Service received the Network Library of the Year Award from NLS.

Read for a Lifetime wrap-up

Read for a Lifetime is the State Library's popular reading program designed for high school students. Here is a wrap-up of the 2011-12 school year:

- 993 readers from 76 high schools and public libraries participated.
- 5,356 books were read.
- 42 seniors received certificates for participating all four years of high school.
- 24 students read all 25 titles on the reading list.
- The Top 5 most read books were *The Great Gatsby; Willow; What Happened to Goodbye; Because I Am Furniture* and *Rules of Attraction.*

Ray Bradbury — An Illinois literary legend

August 22, 1920 - June 5, 2012

Legendary science-fiction author Ray Bradbury, a Waukegan native, died in June at age 91 at his home in California. Bradbury's acclaimed works include Fahrenheit 451, The Martian Chronicles, The

Illustrated Man, Dandelion Wine and Something Wicked This Way Comes.

Bradbury was the final living author of the 35 authors whose names are inscribed on the fourth-floor frieze of the Illinois State Library, Gwendolyn Brooks Building in Springfield (see below). In 2008, Bradbury received the Illinois Center for the Book's Illinois Literary Heritage Award during central Illinois' "The Big Read" campaign, for which *Fahrenheit 451* was the featured reading selection.

Libraries may purchase equipment such as computers, software, scanners, electronic book readers and printers, and may host technology workshops or hire instructors to teach patrons basic computer skills, résumé writing, social networking and other technology-related skills.

CARLI approves digitization project

The Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Illinois (CARLI) has partnered with the Open Content Alliance on the digitization of key materials from research libraries. The project will include the State Library's collection from the legislative, executive and judicial branches of Illinois government and include such documents as *The Annual Report of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (1978-2010); The Executive Orders of the Governors (1990-2010);* and *The Annual Report of the Illinois Courts: Administrative Summary (1991-2010).* These materials will be useful to government officials and staffs, students and historians who are researching trends and separation of powers issues in state government since adoption of the 1970 Illinois Constitution.

Computer literacy training grant for WebJunction

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has announced a \$250,000 grant for WebJunction to help libraries plan and deliver computer literacy training, as well as to identify model approaches for partnerships with libraries to meet public demand for training. WebJunction will work with the Illinois State Library, state libraries in Mississippi and West Virginia, federal policy makers and Connect2Compete, a national nonprofit organization with an ambitious goal to "harness digital opportunity for all Americans." During the past year, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) announced major commitments from the private sector, foundations and individuals to work with Connect2Compete.


