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WHITE AWARDS \$3.9 MILLION IN LIBRARY SERVICES AND TECHNOLOGY ACT GRANTS

SPRINGFIELD—Secretary of State and State Librarian Jesse White today awarded 336 Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grants totaling more than \$3.9 million to help libraries enhance their collections, foster stronger community relationships, develop digital imaging projects and implement new library programs and initiatives.

“These grants show a continuing effort by Illinois libraries to provide new and innovative services to patrons,” White said. “Our libraries have been extremely creative in suggesting new programs and initiatives to deal with specific issues in their local communities, particularly in the area of expanding or enhancing services to underserved populations. As State Librarian, I am proud to be able to provide these important funds to our librarians so that they may continue to enrich the lives of Illinois citizens.”

White cited several examples of creative programs that will be funded by FY2005 LSTA grants:

- The Centralia Regional Library District will provide on-site library services to nursing home residents.
- The East Dubuque District Library will create a digital photography camp for families.
- The Calumet City Public Library will provide funding to allow library staff to learn Spanish.
- Glenview Community Consolidated School District 34 will create a multi-generational storytelling program allowing students and seniors to tell the stories of their lives to each other.
- To address a specific local need, the Prospect Heights Public Library District will create a Russian language newsletter developed by staff fluent in the language.
- Northern Illinois University will digitize materials published in Illinois newspapers during the American Civil War.

White said this year’s grants were awarded in four categories:

- “Weed and Feed” grants allow libraries to enhance their circulating non-fiction collections, review their collection policies to weed and purchase new materials in selected Library of Congress/Dewey Decimal Classifications. The grants also encourage the use of cooperative collection management for a group of libraries.
- The grant offering “The Library: A Community Resource Without Walls” provides Illinois libraries, working individually or with partners, an opportunity to explore and expand community relationships. Grants may be used for such items as expanding a library service area, diversity projects that respond to library issues relating to minorities, ethnic groups and/or cultural diversity, and emerging population projects that respond to issues relating to, but not limited to, such groups as teenagers, home schoolers, and/or seniors.
- Digital Imaging grants allow libraries to create Internet-ready electronic versions of their materials and collections, specifically Illinois-related historical and cultural materials. Digital Imaging grants assist libraries in developing successful digital imaging projects and provide greater access to collections.
- The grant offering “Libraries Leading the Way” is an opportunity for libraries, working individually or in partnerships, to implement programs designed around new ideas or successful ideas that have been tried elsewhere. This grant provides individual and/or partnering libraries with the opportunity to try something new or to enhance and develop previously tested ideas and take them to a new level.

The Illinois State Library administers LSTA grants with funds distributed by the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services. Public, school, academic and special libraries are all eligible to receive the grants.

Canton	Illinois School Library Media Association	\$50,000.00	"Students With School Libraries Succeed!" is a grass roots effort to showcase the academic impact and value of school libraries for student achievement. The goal of "Students...Succeed!" is to publicize the results of the Illinois Study, which compared ISAT/PSAE scores with the presence of school libraries and librarians. Team members, armed with survey results, will become advocates for school libraries throughout the state. "Students With School Libraries Succeed!" will train members of the library and education communities and assist them in making presentations to legislators and local community groups using specially designed "Students With School Libraries Succeed!" tool-kits.
Centralia	Centralia Regional Library District	\$57,900.00	Nursing home residents are often left out of traditional library services. Studies have shown that to live a life of quality the brain needs to be kept stimulated. Bibliotherapy is a technique which suggests that books can help people connect back to life. Providing nursing home residents with on site library service in non-traditional ways allows them to means to cope with their lives and surroundings by encouraging them through therapeutic distraction and interaction with a variety of library material formats. Libraries can lead the way by providing compassionate and specialized library service to an overlooked group in society.
Coal Valley	Prairie Area Library System	\$61,900.00	"One System, One Book" offers a reading program to academic, public, school, and special libraries throughout the newly merged Prairie Area Library System. Copies of the chosen book are provided to participating libraries along with resource guides, marketing materials, supplemental programs, author visits, and a website. A sense of community is fostered

			as readers come together through literature. Connections between librarians from the former three systems are made and unity is strengthened within the new system.
Champaign	Champaign Public Library	\$158,625.00	The library will take a leadership role in the community to help make sure that every child has the experiences necessary to become a successful reader. This will be done by getting the community's attention through a professionally designed advertising campaign; reaching parents of new-born infants before they leave the hospital; giving books to low-income families; teaching parents, caregivers and community members how to effectively read to children; and working in the classrooms of an elementary school to enhance student's reading skills.
Champaign	Lincoln Trail Libraries System	\$90,000.00	This grant will establish a model program to increase rural library service to diverse populations. Rural libraries in east central Illinois will work to develop a knowledge base of skills in diversity and cultural competency, resources on issues related to developing cultural awareness, public programming for diverse populations, fostering community discussions, forums, cultural competency training, Command Spanish language training, and planning and implementing collaborative programs to serve needs of diverse populations in rural areas.
Chicago	Illinois Library Association	\$10,000.00	"Superheroes--Powered by Books" is the theme of the 2005 IREAD program, designed to excite a love of reading among Illinois children. The ideas of librarians across Illinois have culminated in a comprehensive program that includes a list of books, plays, games, contests, and other activities around the theme of superheroes. Libraries also received ideas for promoting the program and involving local businesses and organizations. The 2005 IREAD Resource Guide, in print and electronic format, is available to all Illinois public and elementary school libraries free of charge, thanks to a grant

			from the Illinois State Library.
East Dubuque	East Dubuque District Library	\$32,412.00	The library will offer a Geocoaching and a Digital Photography Camp in a program, "21st Century Technology for Family Recreation". Geocoaching uses a device to track satellite signals using longitude and latitude to find "treasures" the librarians will hide in a historic park. "Treasures" will contain information about the historic park and nature of the area. Families will learn digital photography from taking photos in the field to manipulating the photos with computer software. GPS and Photography Activity Backpacks will be available for check-out. A picture maker machine, software and books related to the activities will sustain this program.
East Peoria	Fondulac Public Library District	\$130,000.00	This project provides 42 public and school libraries across four Illinois library systems the opportunity to offer e-book service to their nearly 425,000 residents. To overcome the distances of this multisystem project, the participants are meeting virtually using iVocalize (a web-based conferencing system), V-Tel (videoconferencing) and e-mail. Participants are learning the status and trends of e-books, how to introduce new services and how to communicate in the virtual world. By cooperating and combining resources, these libraries are now able to offer the latest technological service not previously possible.
Edwardsville	Lewis and Clark Library System	\$60,000.00	A previously unserved area in south-central Illinois is demonstrating what library services are all about. Until this time, residents of the greater Coffeen area had no local library resources. With the funding of this grant, more than 1,700 people will benefit from the establishment of a new Illinois public library district.

Rockford	Rockford Public Library	\$130,000.00	The Latino Outreach Program is breaking down the language barrier for 15,000 people of Latino heritage in Rockford, Illinois. Bilingual outreach coordinators are working in the schools, churches and even grocery stores of the Latino community to spread the word, in Spanish, of how a public library can help children do better in school and adults find better jobs. In collaboration with the Rockford Literacy Council and local Hispanic community centers, the program offers free classes on English as a Second Language, computers, citizenship, adult education, G.E.D. completion and tutoring for children after school.
Sterling	Sterling Public Library	\$67,650.00	Sterling Public Library is making a dream a reality by bringing nationally known storytellers to the community to hold weeklong storytelling workshops. Our library has expanded hours of service dramatically expanded our collection, and improved the usability of the library for all of our patrons, in order to demonstrate the types of improvements that are possible by becoming a district library serving the entire school district population.
Ashland	Ashland Public Library District	\$6,000.00	A link off the library's home page will attract nonreaders and existing patrons to new books. Bushnell	Bushnell Public Library District	\$12,710.00	Joining Together for a Brighter Future will allow the public library to enhance its working relationship with the local community college by establishing a satellite collection at the community college, making necessary technology revisions to place the library's collection online, and by training college and library staff to more adequately meet the needs of the college students.
Calumet City	Calumet City Public Library	\$10,000.00	Due to changing community demographics, people find themselves unable to talk with their neighbors because they don't share a common language. In addition, library staff that don't speak Spanish find it difficult to help Spanish-speaking

			patrons. The Habla Espanol/I Speak English project will teach people who speak Spanish how to speak English, and people who speak English how to speak Spanish. It will also teach library staff to how to speak Spanish, concentrating on the phrases and vocabulary necessary for providing library service. Experience gained from this project will be used to refine and improve future library sponsored language classes.
Carlinville	Carlinville Public Library	\$38,000.00	Families Home Schooling their children now have access to materials and programs at their local libraries that will enhance the curriculum they are using. The local libraries support of this fast growing population is evident in their commitment to provide support and programs to their patrons. Children and parents who Home School are now able to connect at the library. Teachers and parents have additional resources to aid them with their classroom work.

The data collected helps libraries develop more effective long range plans; to increase the number of library patrons; to allocate library resources more efficiently; and to meet the needs and provide services to all members of the community.</p>
Homer Glen	Homer Township Public Library District	\$8,470.00	<p>The library and other libraries in its automation consortium are using the new NISO circulation Interchange Protocol standard to provide facilitated remote access through their websites to the OCLC FirstSearch databases paid for by the Secretary of State through the Illinois State Library. This innovative implementation of NCIP allows members of these libraries' communities to use their library card barcode numbers as direct passwords to search for information in FirstSearch databases from home, work, and other locations outside the libraries, at any time of day.</p>
Joliet	Joliet Public Library	\$49,000.00	<p>In times of community crisis, public libraries play a critical role in educating the community and disseminating information. Working with other emergency responders, libraries provide assembly areas, classes on family safety, business continuity plans, emergency supply kit information as well as presentations to community organizations. In times of crisis, people respond emotionally and with a sense of urgency to start recovery efforts. Community agencies, banded together, are creating a centralized information center with crisis information for all.</p>
Kankakee	Limestone Township Library	\$8,900.00	<p>The Library Learning Center program supports and encourages parents in their role as their child's first teacher. Children are expected to begin school with a larger array of skills than ever before. Many are lacking some essential skills,</p>

			and parents are at a loss as to how to best prepare their children for school. The local library has the materials and programs they need to help their children succeed in school. Story Stretchers programs for preschoolers and their parents model how to use books as stepping stones to learning in other curriculum areas. Storysacks give parents the resources to continue the skill building experiences at home.
Lexington	Lexington Public Library District	\$5,000.00	The library is presenting 10 multi-culture programs. The programs will immerse the audience in different cultures by using music, art, food, history and other means. The programs are supplemented with books and videos on the various cultures. Everyone is welcome to attend these programs which are educational, enlightening and entertaining.
Marshall	Marshall Public Library	\$5,036.00	"Reach Out and Touch Your Community" is a collaborative effort to reach special populations with information about library services, materials, and programs, and also about other community services and information specific and vital to these groups. The Library is partnering with the other local agencies to develop and distribute information packets to four very different targeted groups: new community members, Hispanics (an emerging population), low-income parents, and senior citizens. These packets are being developed with input and materials provided by the other agencies considering the specific needs of each group, and are distributed through new and unique channels. This grant offers approximately 1,000 citizens the opportunity to try out library service through a demonstration project. The grant supports access to general information, formal learning support, lifelong learning, and current reading materials to residents of an area that has never had tax-supported public library service. Residents of all ages are experiencing the benefits of access to a public library for the first time.
Newman	Newman Township Library	\$8,500.00	Future Visions develops a five-year strategic plan for this small rural library to better meet the needs of our patrons and community. The Library Research Center analyzes the Phase One survey of six surrounding townships currently without library service to see if they would form a library district with us. Phase Two is a formal planning process, led by Wiseman Consulting and Technology, involving analysis of existing data, planning meetings, interviews with key community members and a public townhall meeting resulting in a plan for the future of the library with action steps so we contribute significantly to the community.
Norridge	Ridgewood Community High School District #234	\$15,450.00	"Read the Book - Pass it on" provides a unique opportunity to increase multi-cultural understanding in a community where 17 languages, as well as English, are routinely spoken. By distributing 500 books through the communities of Norridge and Harwood Heights for one year, we will expand English skills and form a more connected community. We will work with

			discussion groups, a dedicated web site, an author program, and have participation among teenagers, working adults, and senior citizens to build strong compassionate world citizens.
North Aurora	Messenger Public Library of North Aurora	\$16,000.00	The Community Wellness project improves the health of North Aurora residents by providing citizens with a premiere collection of print and non-print materials focusing on nutrition and fitness. The target audience for REAL QUESTIONS, REAL ANSWERS is parents. Parents are students' first teachers. Ten parent education workshops give parents the tools they need to guide their children to be smart, be safe, be well. A collection of parent education materials is added to the school library collection. These materials are available through interlibrary loan.

Park Forest	Park Forest Public Library	\$49,596.00	Health Smart is a community-library partnership project that collaboratively addresses issues of health literacy and access to health information. Eleven public libraries will be destination sites for free public health screenings and clinics, provided by a municipal public health department. Health Smart will improve patron health access, and open the door to a world of shared resources and expertise. Health Smart will have an immediate positive effect on people struggling to acquire basic health information and demonstrate that the library is a destination for health and wellness information.
Peoria	OSF Saint Francis Medical Center	\$30,000.00	With this proposal, "Community Collaboration, Libraries and Health Literacy: Together We Can Make a Difference" the Library will begin a collaborative relationship with a community agency to address the issue of inadequate health literacy, a problem that affects patient safety and the ability to make informed health care decisions. This proposal will bring awareness and training to healthcare professionals on recognizing patients with low literacy, as well as training in how to create easy to read documents for adult readers to use. These same materials will be freely available on the Library's website, making them accessible to Illinois Libraries as well. If successful, this project will truly expand our services beyond our walls into the healthcare community of the Alliance Library System, as well as to the people who live in the communities of Central Illinois.
Prospect Heights	Prospect Heights Public Library District	\$5,180.00	While libraries are open to all residents, language barriers prevent certain segments of the community from taking full advantage of their services. Creating a Russian newsletter, designed by library staff fluent in Russian, produced quarterly and distributed to local businesses, community centers and churches catering to that population as well as mailed to individual homes will open the doors of the library to Russian
